From Lovetta:

In Memory of Donald Allen 6/28/1939 – 1/6/2020

It is with great sadness to inform all, of the death of my dear friend, and our club member, Don Allen. Don and I have been friends since we were 19 & 20, meeting in 1959.

Don joined the club a few years ago, after going to our chili cook off, and winning the 50/50 drawing. He was embarrassed at winning, and not being a member, so he gave me the money to donate back to the club. (\$88.00) After he got back home in Sacramento, he called and asked me to get him an application, to join. He had enjoyed himself so much and everyone was so friendly, he wanted to be a member. When I explained his donation at the next club meeting, someone piped up that he could pay the initiation fee, membership, and still have a little to donate. Everyone agreed and voted on it at the meeting, so that evening I called him and told him the news.

In spite of living a 6-hour drive away, Don came to as many meetings and outings as possible. In recent years, he was down here nearly every month. His last visit was in October/ November. He couldn't stay for the outing as he had several medical appointments the next couple of weeks, but planned come for holidays and the Christmas party. His physician was concerned about a cough, that Don had for a few weeks, and ordered an x-ray. On Nov. 20th Don was told, he had fluid around his lungs and on the 21st had 3 liters of fluid removed. Don was unable to travel down for Thanksqiving. His doctor told him that the first biopsy was inconclusive, so more tests were ordered. His cough was back and 2 more liters of fluid removed. He was too weak to drive down for the Christmas party. The 9th of December, Don called 911 and went to the hospital for more tests, x-rays, etc. After a week in the hospital, he was diagnosed with pneumonia and a bleeding ulcer. In late December, he was told; he also had stage 4 lung and stomach cancer.

My daughter agreed to take me up there, arriving at the hospital the day after Christmas. Don was extremely thin and weak, but was finally able to stand for a short time, and sit in

a wheel chair to eat. Due to extremely low blood pressure, he was moved to a rehab facility. I visited every day and was hopeful, but he began deteriorate rapidly. He kept apologizing for messing up our plans. (A few months ago he told me he was going to sell his home and buy something around here, buy me rings and we would be together the rest of our lives.) GOD had other plans!

Dec. 31st Don had a bad night, and his son was told; he needed to be transferred to a hospice facility. Don was transported on January 5th, and as I was getting ready to go see him on the 6th, Don's son, Mike called me, Don had passed away. I will never forget you Don! Lovetta

Finds of a lifetime!

We all hope for that one incredible find that makes it all worth while. Recently Harry Surtees found one such treasure. Here's his story:

I'm in the process of painting my house. Since my new metal detector (Minelab Equinox 800) came a week or so ago, I've laid down my paintbrush and headed out metal detecting. Two trips to Jane Reynolds Park, have netted me twenty wheat cents, and four silver dimes. One of the wheat cents was down twelve inches. I love this machine. My third trip to Jane Reynolds found me kitty corner to the park, hitting parkways. A resident came along and offered to let me do his yard. The only thing I found was a wheat penny and a few clad coins. Before I finished, I saw a neighbor across the street taking her trash out to the curb for pick up. So I hurried over and she said yes, I could do her yard. Her husband was real nice and told me how old the house was and said I might find something real interesting. Well, before I started their yard, the first target in the parkway out front was a silver dime. I ended up digging a half dozen wheat cents, twofour clad quarters, and a few other coins. Before I could finish that yard, the next-door neighbor came out and started talking to me. He asked if I was a member of the local club? I told him yes, and he said he was one of the original four people who started the club back in 1980. He told me he doesn't hunt for coins anymore, just gold nuggets in the desert. Naturally, I asked if I could hunt his back yard, since his front yard was all landscape rock. He said, "You can look if you want, but there's nothing there, I've been over it." Well, for me, that's a challenge. He told me to come in the gate when I was ready. Well, I did come in the gate and knocked on the door and he introduced me to his wife, and told me to go for it. Well, that late afternoon, I dug two wheat pennies, and one 1964 dime, and none of them were very deep. The homeowner was surprised, and told me I could come back anytime and finish the yard as it was getting dark. I went back the next day, and the first target I dug, I just couldn't believe. A Capped Bust Silver Dime! How could an 1835 dime be in that early 1900's yard? 1835, that's even before a Seated Coin. This is the oldest silver coin I've found in eight years of metal detecting. Before I finished, I saw a couple pull in their driveway across the street. I went over to inquire, and they said yes too. That made four houses in a row that I got permission and they were all next door or just across the street.

Detecting parkways gets you into the old neighborhoods, and once you're there, anything can happen. The majority of people are really nice, and will give you permission if you ask.






