


4thQtr. 2023 Scavenger Hunt

DESCRIPTION OF BONUS ITEM

The harmonica first appeared in Vienna, Austria, where harmonicas and chambers were sold before 1824. Immigrants from Europe brought this instrument to America where it became very popular among children (an easier instrument to master and carry than the piano) and miners during the late 1800's through the early 20th century. Travelers, cowboys, miners, and others found its light weight and small size a plus when going about their activities. It became so popular at one point that sheet music for it was created and distributed to those wishing to master the instrument.

The harmonica itself from those early days is seldom found intact at the mining sites, being constructed usually of tin and/or wood. Unusual models were occasionally constructed of finer metals at the request of the players. Those are extremely rare to fine and are seldom found at the sites of working class families and miners. Usually only the reed is found when exploring the mining camps, old ranches steads, and early homes.


Get on CA-14 S from Park N Ride Ave S (0.5 mi)
