



The main scavenger hunt will remain the same as in previous years, possibly a little more challenging, but the rewards are the same.


However, the finding of a "bonus item" has been added with the following rules:

DESCRIPTION OF BONUS ITEM

Square or cut nail only — no round or horseshoe

What year were square nails used? Square nails were made from the late 1700's until about 1830. Most were machine-cut and finished off by a blacksmith, who squared the heads. From 1830 to 1890, cabinet makers used headless, machine-cut nails that are tapered, rectangular shape. Modern brads, or penny nails, were introduced around 1890.

When did nails go from square to round? Until about 1880, nails were hand-forged—tapered square shafts and rectangular heads. Since around 1900, the round wire nails with straight sides and a round heads have been the standard.



Is there something you're not sure is gold or silver? Or even possibly a gemstone?

Then you need an assayer!

Carpinteria State Beach

Located within minutes of the urban centers of Santa Barbara and Ventura, Carpinteria State Beach offers visitors the opportunity to enjoy high-quality outdoor recreation in the setting of a small southern California coastal Community. With terraced bluffs, dune areas and a mile of beach for swimming, surf fishing, tide pool exploring and camping, Carpinteria State Beach is a unique treasure with a rich biological and cultural history.


In 1769, the Spanish explorer Gaspar de Portola explored the Santa Barbara coast, eventually meeting the local Chumash people at the village of 'Mishopshnow' near what we now call Carpinteria Creek. Portola observed several of their plank "Tomol" canoes being constructed and the incorporation of the naturally-occurring asphaltum (tar) into its design. Members of the Spanish expedition referred to the area as La Carpinteria or 'The Carpenter Shop,' later to become Carpinteria.

Take best route to Highway 101 (old Coast Highway). Go north to Casitas Pass Road. West (left turn) on Casitas Pass Road. Go west on Casitas Pass Road to Carpinteria Avenue. North (right turn) on Carpinteria Avenue to Palm Avenue. West (left turn) on Palm Avenue and follow it into the Carpinteria State Beach.

Approximate travel times: 2 hours, 9 minutes.
